Singapore National Pavilion 新加坡国家馆

Theme of Pavilion “Connect Singapore – Your Window to ASEAN and the World”

Singapore has developed from a third to first-world country within a short span of 49 years. We have built on our geographical advantage and established a strong network of air and sea routes, supported by a conducive and cosmopolitan business environment. We have also developed innovative solutions to overcome our inherent urban development challenges, making Singapore a highly liveable and multicultural city. Singapore has also become an attractive location and a window for companies and individuals to connect to the region and the world.

Air Connectivity 顶级的空运枢纽

Changi Airport serves more than 100 airlines through physical and code-share operations, flying to over 300 cities in about 70 countries and territories worldwide, with more than 6,500 weekly scheduled flights. As a leading cargo hub in Asia, Changi plays an integral role for global trade. Changi International Airport is the 5th busiest international airport in the world, handling more than 53 million passenger movements in 2013 and has won more than 450 awards.

Sea Connectivity 卓越的海运枢纽

Today, with 90% of world trade carried by sea, we continue to develop Singapore’s sea transport connectivity so that we remain integrated into the global economy. The port of Singapore received the ‘Best Seaport in Asia’ award 26 times out of the 28 times it has been nominated, at the ‘Asian Freight and Supply Chain Awards’ (AFSCA). Singapore is also connected by 200 shipping lines to 600 container ports in 123 countries, with daily sailings to every major port of call in the world.

A Dynamic Business Hub 活力四射的商务枢纽

Singapore’s strong fundamentals stem from its reputation for trustworthiness, sound governance and a strong legal framework. With an open and efficient business environment and strategic location for fostering cultural, economic and academic exchanges, Singapore is the gateway between Asia and the rest of the world. Singapore’s workforce has also been recognised as No. 1 in the world.

A Future-Ready Global City 面向未来的环球城市

As a city state, Singapore has to cater for land use in housing, industry, business, social, recreational and infrastructure needs (such as seaports, airports, utilities, reservoirs and military training areas) in our limited 716 sq km land area, which is about one-tenth the size of Nanning city’s urban area. Our planners must consider all land use demands comprehensively, so that potential trade-offs between uses can be evaluated holistically.
